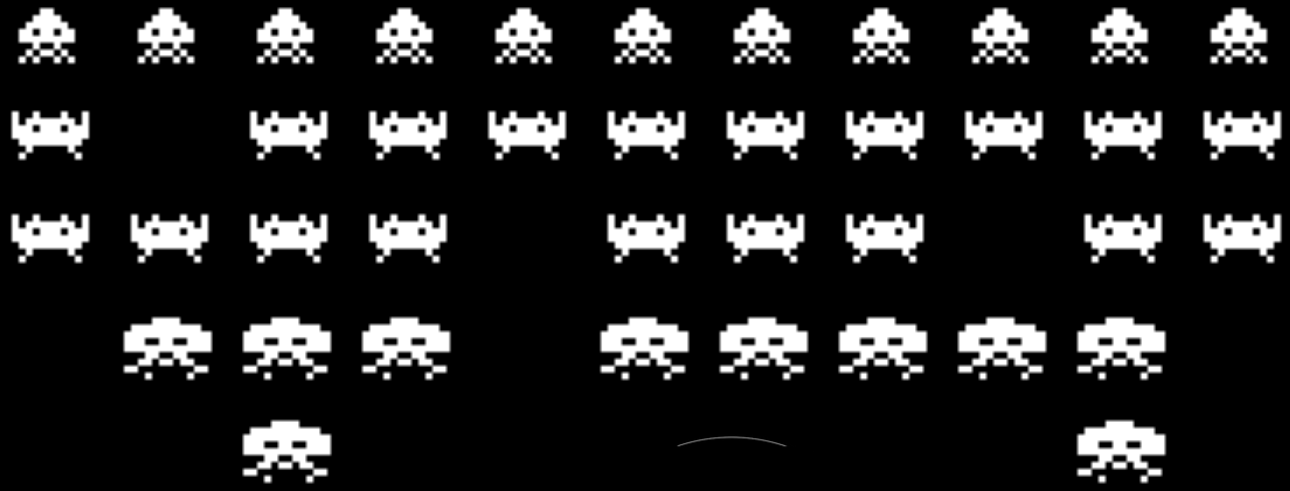
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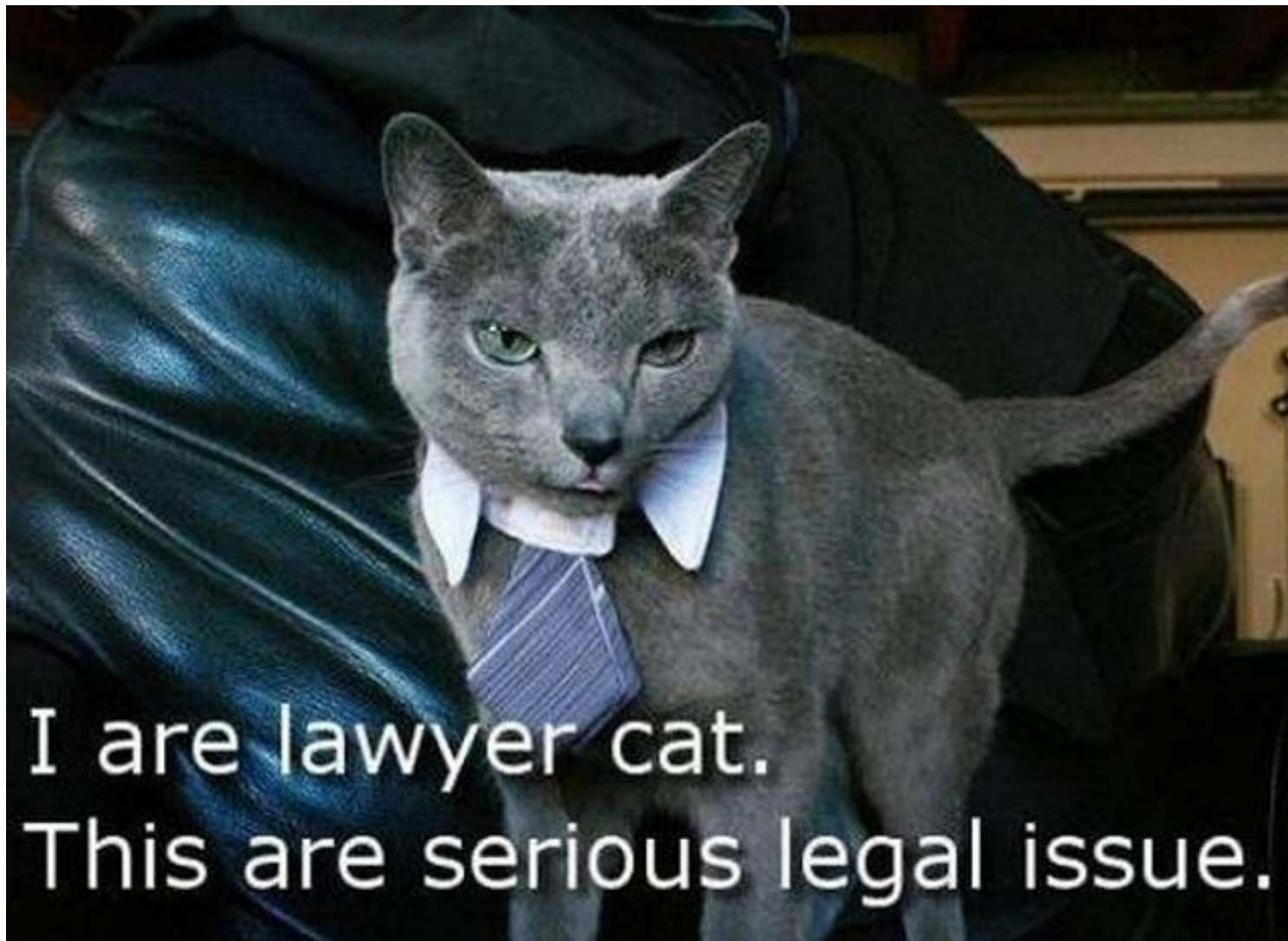

ANALYTICAL FRAMEWORK

- Intended effects/actual effects
- Context within a greater campaign
- Technology utilized
- Participant + organizer population

INTENDED EFFECTS/ACTUAL EFFECTS

- IGC/Euskal Herria Journal action (1997)
 - targeting an ISP to remove online content
- EDT/Lufthansa action (2001)
 - targeting an airline's homepage to stop corporate behavior
- etoy/toywar (1999)
 - targeting an e-commerce store to draw attention to a legal dispute

CONTEXT WITHIN LARGER CAMPAIGN

- EDT/Lufthansa action (2001)

 - connections with the “Deportation Class” action

- etoym/toymwar (1999)

TECHNOLOGY USED

- FloodNet, LOIC, etc
 - “automated” vs “manual” actions
- Operation Payback
 - Botnets: volunteer vs non volunteer
 - Exploits

PARTICIPANT + ORGANIZER POPULATIONS

- Informed consent
- Risk awareness
- Training and support

NEXT STEPS

- Develop analysis for state/state-related actors
- Adapt the framework from a reflective to a prescriptive model
